

OFFICIAL RULES & REGULATIONS

SECTION 1. GENERAL FAIR RULES & REGULATIONS: Date of Last update: February 6, 2018

- 1) The 2018 Delta County Fair will be held August 5th - August 12th at the Fairgrounds in Hotchkiss, Colorado. These rules shall serve as the Official Delta County Fair Rules and are available in the 2018 Fair Premium Book and online at www.deltacountyfair.com. The most up-to-date version of Official Rules will be posted to the website and any rules on the website with a newer date above than the ones in the Premium Book will take precedence.
- 2) **THESE RULES APPLY TO OPEN CLASS AND 4-H/FFA EXHIBITORS EQUALLY EXCEPT WHERE NOTED THAT RULES ARE FOR JUNIOR DIVISION EXHIBITORS ONLY. It is the responsibility of all exhibitors to know and adhere to all rules in their project area(s).**
- 3) Heritage Hall will be open as follows:
 - a) Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday – 9:00 am to 7:00 pm
 - b) Sunday – 8:00 am to 12 noon
- 4) Every article and animal (except horses, dogs and open livestock) on exhibition must remain until the close of the fair, and removal will be not allowed until 8 AM on Sunday. Market livestock will be released after buy-back and processor load-out is completed on Sunday.
- 5) When no premiums are offered, space will be allotted, when possible, to those wishing to exhibit meritorious articles, and convenience offered for advertising.
- 6) **Superintendents have full control of the arrangement of articles in their departments and exhibitors will refer to them all matters relating to the same. A livestock superintendent must be present and in charge of their species at load-out time.**
- 7) No one will be allowed to act as a judge in a class where he or she is an exhibitor or has any relatives exhibiting.
- 8) Open Class Awards will be designated as follows: Blue ribbons indicate first place and premium Red ribbons indicate second place (no premium) White ribbons indicate third place (no premium). Rosette ribbons indicate sweepstakes. Champion & Reserve Champion in Junior Division only. Ribbons will be placed at time of judging.
- 9) In the event there are no more than 5 exhibitors per species or division at the Delta County Fair, a local judge or Fair Board member will be retained to judge the classes relating to that species/division.
- 10) Each superintendent will exercise great care in preserving and returning all books and sheets of his/her department, as all payment of premiums are authorized only upon entries contained therein.
- 11) Premiums will be paid from 8:00 AM to 12:00 PM on the last Sunday of fair, at the fairgrounds only. Premiums paid in cash except where otherwise noted. Special premiums in cash or merchandise at the option of persons offering same. Any and all premiums not picked up by 12:00 PM will be forfeited.
- 12) The Delta County Fair Board reserves the right to withhold premiums awarded in case of violation of any rule governing any department of the Delta County Fair.
- 13) **Dogs on grounds will be on a leash at all times. Dogs are not allowed in the exhibit, livestock or camping areas. Competition dogs must stay in the competition area. Service dogs are exempted from restriction, however they must be on a leash. Livestock and horses will not be allowed in the concession area.**
- 14) The Fair Board will take every precaution for the safety of articles exhibited, but does not assume any responsibility in case of loss or damage. Special police will be appointed to keep watch during the fair. All entries are accepted with the understanding that neither the show organization nor the sponsoring group shall be held responsible for any damage, accidents or loss of livestock on exhibition or for sale.
- 15) Under no circumstances will any person or firm be allowed to place advertisements upon the buildings, trees, or any place on the grounds without permission from Delta County Fair Board.
- 16) Exhibits may not be marked for sale, nor is the sale of exhibits permitted at the fair, except during the Junior Market Livestock Sale.
- 17) Exhibitors will be eligible to receive no more than (2) two Delta County Fair Premiums per class.
- 18) **The City of Hotchkiss ordinance that prohibits consumption of alcoholic beverages on public property will be enforced everywhere on the fairgrounds except in designated areas.**
- 19) In the absence of a specific rule, any dispute will be resolved by the Fair Board or its designated representative based upon other rules, custom and practice, and fairness.
- 20) **THE DECISION OF ALL JUDGES IS FINAL.**
- 21) All exhibitors are expected to behave respectfully and in a courteous manner.
- 22) All exhibitors should show respect for others and the property of others, including in Heritage Hall.
- 23) Unethical practices, such as violating exhibiting rules and regulations, removing of ribbons or registration forms and misrepresenting of information concerning registration, will not be allowed or tolerated.
- 24) **Any person or individual found harassing livestock, causing any disturbance, causing harm to livestock or another individual, or caught being responsible for a theft on the fairgrounds may be removed from the grounds by the Delta**

County Fair Board and/or any security person. The person in question may not be allowed to return for the duration of the fair if so deemed by Delta County Fair Board.

- 25) Motorized personal conveyances, i.e. golf carts, gators, ATVs, electric chairs, may be operated on the Delta County Fair Grounds during the Delta County Fair only by Fair Board members, office staff, designated fair officials, and handicapped participants/spectators.
- 26) False representation regarding any exhibit, interference with judges or unsportsmanlike conduct on part of any exhibitor will be dealt with according to the rules of the Delta County Fair.
- 27) No unworthy animal or article shall be awarded a prize. In such cases the judges shall decide whether the animal or article is entitled to an award or not, and, where there is no competition, premiums shall be awarded on merit. Where only one animal is exhibited in a class, first money will be highest award if animal merits it, at the discretion of the judges; if animal merits on a second, only second money will be given, etc.
- 28) Any suggestions for improvement of the Fair should be presented to the department superintendent(s) or brought to the attention of the Fair Board by Monday following the Fair.

SECTION 2. CAMPING RULES:

1. Camping either on or behind the fairgrounds is not free. Every person in a camper (except vendors) is required to purchase an all-inclusive wristband that will allow entrance to all events. This is required to control access to all events after hours.
2. No open fires are allowed. No alcohol is allowed except in designated areas. No dogs allowed.
3. No generators allowed after 10:00 pm.
4. To purchase a camping pass/wristband(s) go to the Delta County Fair website at www.deltacountyfair.com or contact the Camping Superintendent(s). The camping pass must be displayed in a conspicuous place. Contact the Fair Board member in charge of camping with any questions.
5. Failure to obey these regulations could result in the camper being asked to leave or having their camper removed from the grounds.
6. **At all times, minors camping on the fairgrounds must be supervised by a responsible adult.**

SECTION 3. ENTRY RULES/REQUIREMENTS:

- 1) All 4-H & FFA Members exhibiting in any class, group classes or showmanship entries **MUST PRE-ENTER SUCH ENTRIES AND CLASSES AND DELIVER COMPLETED MARKET LIVESTOCK SALE INVITATION FORMS NO LATER THAN JULY 6, 2018 at 4:30 pm to:** CSU Extension Office, 525 Dodge Street, Delta, CO 81416. After that date no animals or classes may be added to entry. **Pre-entries are final.**
- 2) **A copy of the BRAND INSPECTION papers for all BEEF BREEDING animals must accompany the pre-entry papers when turned into the CSU Extension Office in July.** If they are not with the pre-entries, the exhibitor will not be allowed to show in the beef breeding show.
- 3) **ALL OPEN CLASS LIVESTOCK INCLUDING POULTRY & RABBITS MUST PRE-ENTER SUCH ENTRIES.** Pre-entry forms are available at the CSU Extension Office at 525 Dodge Street, Delta, CO 81416 or on www.deltacountyfair.com. **PRE-ENTRIES ARE DUE BY JULY 6, 2018 at 4:30 pm to the CSU Extension Office.**
- 4) **ALL open class NON-LIVESTOCK entries will be made between 8:00 AM and 7:00 PM Tuesday of the Delta County Fair at the Fairgrounds.** Use entry blanks provided in this book. All entries must be in place by 6:00 PM on entry day, with the exception of fresh fruits, vegetables, flowers, frozen goods, cream pies and baked items.
- 5) In order to secure a premium, all articles must be properly entered.
- 6) Every animal or article shall be entered and exhibited in the name of its bonafide owner except where noted.
- 7) **All poultry and rabbit exhibits must be checked in and caged in the barn between 3:00 and 6:00 pm, Monday August 7th.**
- 8) **All Junior Division livestock entries must be stalled in their respective barn by 6:00 pm Tuesday, August 8.**

SECTION 4. GRIEVANCES:

- 1) **A person who considers himself/herself aggrieved is encouraged to first settle the matter informally. If such an attempt is not successful, grievances, including protests alleging unethical practices and rule violations, must be filed within one (1) hour of the conduct creating the grievance or the alleged violation. Persons must file a written and signed grievance with the Delta County Fair Board President or designee, accompanied by a \$75 cash deposit or certified check, which will be forfeited if the grievance or protest is not sustained. The grievance shall plainly state the cause of the complaint and provide sufficient detail for the matter to be investigated. Upon receipt of the protest, the Fair Board President shall refer the protest to the Rules Committee, which shall investigate the matter and issue written findings within 24 hours of receipt. The findings of the Rules Committee are final and shall be presented to the Fair Board for its information.**
- 2) Grievances or other concerns involve a policy or practice of the Fair Board or the Fair, rather than relating to a specific incident shall be presented in writing to the Fair Board President for consideration by the Fair Board and/or Executive

Committee, and need not be acted upon within 24 hours. **Any dispute that cannot be resolved by the species superintendent(s) will be taken to the Overall Livestock Superintendent.**

SECTION 5. LIVESTOCK – GENERAL RULES/REGULATIONS

1. **THESE RULES/REGULATIONS ARE APPLICABLE TO BOTH OPEN CLASS AND 4-H/FFA EXHIBITORS EXCEPT WHERE NOTED.**
2. Any exhibitor found by the Delta County Fair Board to be not properly feeding or caring for his/her livestock will forfeit all premiums and awards.
3. Any animal deemed unmanageable or unsafe by the species superintendent, general livestock superintendent, judge or a Delta County Fair Board Member will be released and removed from the fairgrounds. The animal will be ineligible to show.
4. **All Market Livestock must be controllable; i.e. – Beef must be halter broke at initial weigh-in in February. For each species, controllable is at the discretion of the species superintendent, the general livestock superintendent or a Delta County Fair Board Member. If your animal is deemed uncontrollable, you will not be allowed to weigh-in at initial and/or Fair Weigh-Ins.**
5. All Livestock must meet Colorado import requirements and Federal Interstate requirements. Any animal found showing evidence of infectious, contagious or communicable disease or any animal deemed to be present a danger to the health, safety or welfare of the participants or spectators by the species superintendent will be immediately withdrawn from the show and the owner will take the animal home. The animal will not be able to sell through the Junior Market Livestock Sale.
6. No tranquilizers are allowed to be used on any livestock exhibited at the fair.
7. **Due to limited pen space, NO overnight accommodations will be made available to open class livestock.**
8. All open livestock entries must be checked in at the Livestock Office two hour prior to the show of that particular species. Animals will not be allowed to show if check-in is not completed.
9. Death of any livestock (market or other) will not be the responsibility of the Fair Board or Junior Market Livestock Sale Committee but rather that of the purchaser at the time of sale or otherwise bonafide owner.
10. **Open classes are open to ALL exhibitors. The class may be eliminated if the entries are a duplication of a prior Junior class.**
11. Market livestock may be shown in an open class but are not eligible for sale in the Junior Market Livestock Sale.
12. **LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS WILL BE REQUIRED TO STORE THEIR EXTRA FEED/TACK/SUPPLIES IN A DESIGNATED AREA SPECIFIED BY THE SPECIES SUPERINTENDENT. Each 4-H Club or FFA chapter will be allowed ONE (1) stock trailer to be parked in the exhibitor parking lot northwest of the Livestock Building for small animals/hogs/sheep/goats and ONE stock trailer per club for beef exhibitors south of the Beef Barn. Designated space may also be provided for storage in the Old Beef Barn on the north end of the Livestock Building. At no time shall tack or feed be stored in the fire lane.**
13. All animals entered in breeding classes cannot compete for market or feeder classes.
14. In an effort to eradicate scrapie in the United States, USDA requires sheep/goats to have flock identification ear tags that list their flock of origin. Animals required to have flock ID tags include: all sheep/goats sexually intact regardless of age and wethers 18 months of age and older or upon change of ownership. All sheep/goats eligible for show or exhibition must have a registration tattoo regardless of age.
15. The species superintendent(s) shall have the authority to divide their division into classes as needed. Market livestock classes will be broke by weight.
16. Diseased or injured animals may be removed from the grounds upon recommendations of the attending species superintendents, general livestock superintendent or an attending veterinarian. A release must be signed by the species superintendent. Removal of animals from the fairgrounds prior to release time will result in the loss of premiums. Animals deemed unworthy of competition by superintendent may be barred from competition and removed from the fairgrounds.

SECTION 6. 4-H/FFA DIVISION RULES/REGULATIONS

1. This Department is open only to regularly enrolled 4-H Club members and FFA members in Delta County. 4-H exhibitors must be at least age 8 and must not have reached their 19th birthday prior to January 1 of the current year and must satisfy other eligibility requirements for a class to complete in that class. **Juniors are ages 8-9-10, Intermediates ages 11-12-13, and Seniors ages 14 thru 18 as of December 31, 2017.** FFA exhibitors must be enrolled in a local Delta County FFA Chapter and may show market animals but must have reached their 19th birthday prior to January. FFA Members may show breeding animals up to their 22nd birthday, as of January. To be eligible to exhibit in the Delta County Fair, the exhibitor must be enrolled in or graduated from the Delta County School District and/or must be a resident of and residing in Delta County for the duration of the 4-H/FFA project. Enrollment is defined as where the student is counted for the state enrollment.
2. Each 4-H Member must be enrolled in his/her project(s) by May 1 preceding the county fair with the exception of those livestock projects, which already have different enrollment deadlines.
3. Check-in and interview judging of 4-H general project exhibits will be on **Saturday, August 4, 2018.**
4. Exhibits in 4-H/FFA Division are subject to rule and regulation changes made by the State 4-H Office and Colorado State Fair.

5. The Dress Code is in effect at any time a 4-H Member or FFA member and his/her animal are on display, including in the show ring, sale pictures, the Market Livestock Sale or in the Fair Parade. This rule also applies to any helpers entering these areas.
 - a. All 4-H and FFA members must dress to show respect to their organization. While exhibiting their projects, 4-H and FFA members must wear a button-up or snap shirt that is long enough to tuck in and stay tucked in during ALL Movements. Shirts must be buttoned or snapped all the way from the top to the bottom with the exception of the collar. Collared polo shirts are acceptable with above restrictions.
 - b. No shorts, mini-skirts, sleeveless tops, excessively baggy pants or any clothing that exposes undergarments are allowed at any time while the 4-H or FFA member is exhibiting his/her animal.
 - c. Footwear must be boots or leather shoes. No flip-flops or tennis shoes will be allowed.
 - d. No hats, or caps are allowed in the show ring or sale ring with the exception of the Horse Show.
6. The animal's owner (4-H/FFA Member) should prepare their project animal when it is being exhibited at the Delta County Fair. Assistance may be provided by other Delta County 4-H and FFA Members, parents, guardian, qualified persons, 4-H leaders and FFA advisors. **It is recommended that another Colorado 4-H or FFA member be the first choice of assistance to a junior member. If assistance is provided the Delta County 4-H or FFA member enrolled in the project must be present to benefit from the teaching and instruction. Violation will result in the exhibitor being prohibited from showing that animal.**
7. All 4-H/FFA market animal exhibitors and parents or guardians will be required to sign a Certification and Statement of Disclosure – USDA Wholesome Meat Act form for each animal sold. **Forms are due one (1) hour after the conclusion of the show. Exhibitors will not be allowed to sell until the completed form(s) are turned in.**
8. The Delta County Fair enforces and supports the USDA Wholesome Meat Act and insists that exhibitors are in compliance. Exhibitors of all market animals entries must certify their compliance with manufacture's withdrawal period specified for any and all medications, drugs and pesticides or feed additives administered. The use of any non-approved chemical or improper use of approved chemicals is strictly prohibited.
9. The Delta County Fair reserves the right to screen or test any animal for drug residues or any nature and take any action deemed appropriate if testing results show any positive residues exceeding FDA/EPA/USDA established tolerances for any foreign substance including medications, drugs, pesticides, feed additives or chemicals. Delta County Fair reserves the right to pass any and all fees required for testing onto the exhibitor.
10. **All exhibitors must have completed a Meat Quality Assurance training as required. MQA Certification is required for new exhibitors and for exhibitors moving to a new level.**
11. All 4-H and FFA animals must be cared for, shown and sold by the owner. In case of emergency, another Delta County 4-H or FFA member may care for, show or sell the animal with the approval of the livestock Division Superintendent and the Rules Committee. **Under no circumstances may an adult assist or show an animal exhibited in the junior division in the show ring.**

SECTION 6.01: MARKET LIVESTOCK WEIGN-INS

1. Market animals to be exhibited in the Delta County fair must be identified by an official Delta County Fair ear tag. The Delta County Fair Board and CSU Extension will tag all animals.
2. Exhibitors will be charged a \$2.00 fee per head on all market livestock at the initial weigh-in date for each species.
3. Market animals may be brought to **initial** weigh-in by parents, guardians or other 4-H/FFA Exhibitors in the event an exhibitor is ill, unable to attend due to sports, school activities, religion or other exigent circumstances. In all such cases, the individual(s) bringing the animal(s) to initial weigh-in must pay all required fees, and provide/complete all required paperwork for the animals to be properly tagged and entered as eligible to exhibit at the Delta County Fair.
4. **If an exhibitor or their designee does not present their animal(s) or complete required paperwork and pay required fees during the advertised times set for initial weigh-in, they shall not be allowed to exhibit such animal(s) at the up-coming fair.**
5. **ALL MALE ANIMALS MUST BE CASTRATED, WITH EVIDENCE OF DRYING, BEFORE THE TIME OF INITIAL WEIGH-IN.**
6. **Initial weighing of beef, goats and sheep is mandatory, thus all animals must be presented at the fairgrounds and be weighed and tagged at the initial weigh-in on the date(s) set by the CSU Extension Office and advertised.**
7. **Brand inspection certificates on all market beef must be available at initial and fair weigh-in. NO ANIMAL WILL BE WEIGHED IN AT FAIR UNLESS THE BRAND CERTIFICATE IS IN HAND WHEN COMING TO THE SCALES.**
8. **Swine members must obtain ear tags prior to the weigh-in date from the CSU Extension Office in Delta. Members must then tag each hog with an official Delta County Fair tag assigned to them, in the right ear and take five (5) pictures of each animal. Pictures must include:**
 - a. A back shot to show the placement of the ear tag and clearly show the number; a Right side view showing distinct markings; a Left side view showing distinct markings; a rear view to show sex of hog and proof of castration if male; and a face photo.

- b. Photos must be within a reasonable space and no more than 10' from the animal. Photos should only include the animal that is being entered. Photos must be printed on no more than two (2) pages.
9. Members must pay the \$2 per head tag fee to their club leader at the receipt of the tag(s) for their pig(s). After pigs are tagged, all swine exhibitors must take their registration paperwork and photos to the **CSU Extension Office by 5:00 pm on May 4th**. **Failure to provide photos and paperwork as outlined above by the deadline will result in the exhibitor not being allowed to show at the Delta County Fair. Neither the Extension Office nor the Fair Board will print or receive pictures electronically and no photos, registration paperwork or ear tagging fees will be accepted after the deadline has passed.**
 - a. The exhibitor and their parents must fill out any necessary paperwork and pay required weigh-in fees by the deadline specified above.
10. **Market swine exhibitors wishing to compete in the Premier Exhibitor Program MUST bring their hogs to the fairgrounds on the date of weigh-in and have the animals weighed. These exhibitors must also bring the required paperwork as specified above.**
11. At the initial weigh-in, there will be no limit on the number of animals weighed in. **However, because of space, only 4 market animals per exhibitor for sheep and beef and only two (2) market animals per exhibitor for goats and swine can be brought and exhibited at Fair.**
12. In the event that an exhibitors **goats or swine** brought for fair do not make weight, the exhibitor will have the option of returning home and bringing back replacements of his/her **pre-entered and fair tagged swine or goats** to see if they will make weight. That animal must be ready to weigh in as soon as we are finished with weigh-in of all other animals.
13. **FAIR WEIGH IN:** Market goats and sheep will be weighed **Tuesday night at 6:00 pm**. Market Swine and Market Beef will be weighed beginning at **7:00 am on Wednesday**.
14. **THE FAIR WEIGHT IS THE FINAL WEIGHT. Any questions as to accuracy of weigh-in weight must be made at the time the animal is on the scale. There will be no re-weighs.**
15. The 4-H leader or agricultural education instructors must certify as to ownership and project enrollment of the exhibitor. No partnership entries will be accepted. No one exhibit can be entered as both 4-H and FFA projects. An animal must be shown in the project in which member is enrolled. No one animal may be shown in both market and breeding classes and no animal can be shown in more than one county.

SECTION 6.02: MINIMUM MARKET LIVESTOCK WEIGHTS AT FAIR

1. **Market Steers** must weight at least 1050 pounds. **Market Heifers** must weigh at least 950 pounds.
2. **Miniature Breeds** will show in the Junior Market Beef Show. Exhibitors must declare Miniature market steers/heifers as such at initial weigh-in in February. Any animal being entered as a Miniature must present paperwork showing the bloodline of the animal(s) at initial weigh-in. The minimum weight of a miniature shall be 650 pounds to compete in the Market beef show.
3. **Market Sheep** must weigh 100 pounds with no upper weight.
4. **Market Swine** must weight between 230 and 300 pounds.
5. **Market Goats** must weigh 60 pounds with no upper weight.
6. Beef, Sheep, Swine and Goats failing to meet the above weight requirements **will not be allowed to sell**. If an exhibitor's ONLY animal is under or overweight, the exhibitor will be allowed to show that animal in the Showmanship Class or Feeder/Heavy Weight Classes only.

SECTION 6.03: ANIMAL AGES

1. No steers or heifers shall be eligible to show if they have more than two center permanent incisors. All lambs and market goats exhibited must be carrying milk teeth. A Fair Board designated person will determine age.

SECTION 6.04: FEED & WATER

1. **No Animal entered or exhibited at the Delta County Fair shall be deprived of water for any period of time, which may be detrimental to the health and well being of the animal. Fresh potable water will be regularly provided for all entered or exhibited animals within their stall or pen area. Any apparent violation of this rule should be called to the attention of the species or general livestock superintendent.**
2. Arrangements for feeding, watering and care of livestock will be made by the exhibitor. For safety (fire) reasons, straw will not be allowed excepted for dairy cattle. Exhibitors are responsible for caring for sale stock up to load out time.
3. All market animals administered feed additives and/or growth stimulants must be removed from such additives and/or stimulants within the time specified on the label.

SECTION 6.05: PENS & STALLS

1. All pens, stalls and feeding areas must be cleaned daily by no later than 8:00 am and all refuse disposed of according to direction of the Fair Board.

SECTION 6.06: ETHICS

1. **UNETHICALLY FITTED LIVESTOCK:** The following are termed unethical practices:
 - a. Doctoring, doping, tubing or injecting oils, glycerin or like substances for body “fill-ins” or the alteration; Changing/defacing or any modification of the markings of show animal or the anatomical structure of an animal; external applications of: liniments and blistering agents that would cause edematous condition.
 - b. The removal, alteration, changing or purposely damaging ear tags
 - c. The use of ice packs or other refrigerants to alter the quality of the finish of an animal. Icing of animals will not be allowed. Wet towels only will be acceptable. Towels immersed in ice water will not be allowed.
 - d. No drench guns or artificial device for hydrating or feeding of animals will be allowed. Drenching will be allowed only under veterinary care.
 - e. No animal shall be decorated with any unnecessary trappings, etc during the judging or selling.
2. **The natural body color of an animal cannot be altered using any artificial coloring.** However, products that match the animal’s natural color may be used in the fitting process for the knees and hocks down and on the switch only.
 - a. For Example – black products may be used on a black-legged animal, red on red-legged animal and white on white-legged animal, but under no circumstances can color be used to cover an animal’s natural leg color. No altering structure of hair or wool coat except for trimming and blocking will be allowed.
3. Any entry adding an artificial tail head or tail fin, artificial poll or adding any hair or hair-like substance will be disqualified.
4. The showing of livestock of any ineligible age or showing unethically fitted livestock is prohibited.
5. Any Exhibitor, parent, 4-H leader, superintendent, FFA advisor or Extension Agent or staff found to have committed any of the above listed unethical practices, or any other practice deemed unethical by the Fair Board will be subject to the following possible consequences:
 - a. Forfeiture of all premium monies,
 - b. Disqualification from the Junior Market Livestock Sale of the current show year,
 - c. Probation for one (1) year,
 - d. Barred for three (3) years,
 - e. Barred for life or punishment designated by the Fair Board.
6. Failure to comply with these rules will be considered a clear violation of the ethical standards established by the Fair Board. All complaints concerning entries or judging of entries shall be in writing, dated and signed and presented to the superintendent of that department by noon following the day of judging of the project in question. These complaints so presented will be considered by the Fair Board or designated representatives.

SECTION 6.07: SHOWMANSHIP CLASSES

1. Exhibitors entered in Showmanship classes must show their own animals.
2. **SHOWMANSHIP** classes will be divided into three age divisions in all species:
 - a. **Junior Division:** Ages 8, 9 & 10 years old.
 - b. **Intermediate Division:** Ages 11, 12 & 13 years.
 - c. **Senior Division:** 14 years old and over.
3. First place showpersons in Senior, Intermediate and Junior showmanship classes of Beef, Sheep, Swine, Goat, Dairy and Horse are automatically entered in the Round Robin Contest. Ribbons will be given to the first five placings in each division.

SECTION 6.08: MARKET CLASSES

1. In market classes, the superintendent(s) will determine the class divisions and the number of animals in each class after the animals are weighed. The superintendent’s decision on classification will be final.

SECTION 6.09: BREEDING CLASSES

1. **The animal(s) in all breeding classes must have been owned by the exhibitor before May 1, 2018 to be eligible to show.**
2. Breeding animals will show in their class according to age.

SECTION 6.10: CHAMPION CLASSES

1. All animals which have been awarded First Place premiums will be permitted to compete for Grand Champion. After the selection of the Grand Champion, the remaining first place winners and the second place premium winner in the champion's class will compete for Reserve Champion.
2. If the Grand Champion and/or Reserve Grand Champion beef, swine, goat or sheep are Delta County Bred & Fed, they are automatically the Champion/Reserve Champion Bred & Fed in that species.

SECTION 6.11: JUNIOR MARKET LIVESTOCK SALE

1. The Delta County Junior Market Livestock Sale Committee is requiring every 4-H and FFA member who exhibits a Market Livestock Project to invite two businesses or individuals to attend the Market Livestock Sale. These invitations must be documented on the specified form and returned to the Delta Extension Office with your Pre-Entry forms no later than July 6, 2018. Failure on part of the 4-H/FFA member to return this form by the deadline will result in the Sale Committee collecting \$25 per invitation not contacted up to \$50 from the 4-H/FFA member's sale check. These forms are available online at DeltaCountyFair.com or at the CSU Extension Office.
2. The buyers of all livestock at the Junior Market Livestock sale shall designate the destination of every animal they purchased in the sale prior to leaving the grounds. The animal can be put on buyback, sent to a specific processing plant, taken home personally, or turned over to another party. The Junior Sale Committee will arrange transportation to the prearranged processing plants. If buyer chooses to take home or send to a feedlot for further feeding, it becomes the buyer's responsibility to see that those arrangements are made. The Junior Sale Committee and Delta County Fair Board act only as agents for the Junior Market Sale. Death of any livestock will not be the responsibility of the Fair Board or Junior Market Livestock Sale Committee but rather that of the purchaser at the time of sale or other bonafide owner.
3. **All sales final. Any transference of ownership and possession must be handled and take place off of fairgrounds property.**
4. **All exhibitors will be considered as consignors to the sale unless he/she notifies the livestock office within one hour after completion of show that he/she does not desire to sell. If the exhibitor has two animals of one species, within one hour after the show is over the individual must designate which one they intend to sell. If the individual has not designated which qualified animal they intend to sell within one hour after the show, the sale committee will pick the highest placing animal shown by the individual for the sale.**
5. Once a market animal is identified for going through the Junior Market Livestock Sale, another animal may **NOT** be substituted.
6. **If an animal is pulled from the sale after the sale order has been submitted to the printer, the member will not be able to show/sell any market species the following year.**
7. **THE NUMBER OF LOTS IN THE JUNIOR MARKET LIVESTOCK SALE WILL BE LIMITED TO 200.** Each 4-H/FFA exhibitor with animals that qualify for the Market Livestock Sale can sell a **maximum of two (2) animals** in the market livestock sale with no more than one animal per species. If the total number of lots qualifying for the sale exceeds 200 with all eligible animals, the following process will be followed: If an exhibitor only has one (1) qualifying market animal, they will automatically be allowed to sell. If an exhibitor has two (2) market animals eligible for the sale, the exhibitor's highest placing animal will be automatically added to the sale. To reach 200 lots, starting with the lowest placing animals from each class, the lowest placing animal of exhibitors with two species will be entered into a drawing. Animals will then be randomly drawn until the sale reaches a total of 200 lots. If an exhibitor wishes to have their lower placing animal in the sale, their highest placing animal will be removed and not be eligible for the sale unless it is a Grand/Reserve Champion.
8. **All Grand and Reserve Grand Champions of each species will still be required to sell and will be sold first, followed by the Champion/Reserve Champion Delta County Bred & Fed animals if the animal is not one in the same.** Sale order will be determined by the class placing and weight of the qualified animals in the market classes. Delta County Bred & Fed entries in all species will be identified as such in the Market Livestock Sale program.
9. **Buy Back** - Order of animals to be allowed to sell through the buy- back program as space is available will be as follows:
 - a. 1st - Animals going through the sale that buyers purchased and requested to go on buy-back.
 - b. 2nd - Buy-back is available to any entered animal at Delta County Fair in the Junior Market Livestock Program. Information **MUST BE** to the office by Noon on Friday to be eligible for buy-back placement.
10. A 4-H/FFA livestock exhibitor that sells any species of market livestock in any other county fair 4-H/FFA livestock division, during the same calendar year, is **NOT ELIGIBLE** to sell in the 4-H/FFA livestock division of the Delta County Fair.
11. A 5% consignment fee will be charged on all livestock at the Sale. This charge will be used to defray expenses, the cost of publishing a Thank You ad to the buyers and the cost of weighing and tagging programs held prior to fair.
12. **An exhibitor will not be able to sell his/her animal if they have not had their photo taken for sale or if he/she is not on hand to line it up for the sale.**
13. All animals become the property of the buyer at the point of sale, but must be cared for by the exhibitor until released.
14. The Delta County Fair and Junior Market Livestock Sale committee is not liable for any breaches of contracts between the seller and buyer as a result of any condemnation or any other matter.

15. If any animal is condemned at slaughter for any reason, whether by testing results or by any USDA inspector condemnation, Delta County Fair and the Junior Market Livestock Sale Committee may withhold any payment from the exhibitor and returned to the purchaser.
16. **The Junior Market Livestock Sale Committee is requiring both 4-H and FFA members who sell animals at the Delta County Fair to WRITE A THANK-YOU TO THEIR BUYERS in order to receive payment for their animals. Members are required to write a thank-you, and provide an addressed and stamped envelope. Members must deliver their thank you(s) to the CSU Extension Office. If you choose to mail your thank-you to the Extension Office, another stamped envelope must be enclosed for mailing. CHECKS WILL NOT BE AVAILABLE TO ANYONE UNTIL 2 WEEKS AFTER FAIR.**
17. **If the thank you is not turned in, the member will not be allowed to show/sell any market species the following year.**
18. If a 4-H or FFA member who sells animals at the Delta County Fair does not cash their check within the validation period, or if they lose their check, a \$50 fee will be charged upon re-issuance of the check.

SECTION 6.12: HERDSMAN AWARD

1. HERDSMAN AWARD - The Delta County Fair Board will be presenting individual Herdsman Awards. The awards will be presented to the individual or club/chapter of each species who have shown the best management, care, grooming, and cleanliness of all areas during the fair.

SECTION 6.13: ANIMAL LOAD OUT

1. All beef must be in the barn on Sunday morning, by 7:00 am.
2. Buy-back animals may load out Saturday night if determined by Junior Market Sale Committee.
3. **No exhibitors will be allowed in the barn on Sunday morning until all animals being loaded for buy-back and processors have been loaded out. ALL PENS MUST BE CLEANED BY 12 NOON, IN ORDER TO REMAIN A MEMBER IN GOOD STANDING FOR THE FOLLOWING YEAR.**
4. Exhibitors are responsible for caring for sale stock up to load-out time.

PREMIER EXHIBITOR RULES:

1. The Delta County Fair Board will offer a PREMIER LIVESTOCK EXHIBITOR AWARD to 4-H and FFA members enrolled in the Market Beef, Swine, Goat, Sheep, Rabbit and Poultry projects as well as the Horse and Shooting Sports projects. The purpose of this award is to recognize the member whose project exemplifies the educational goals of these programs.
2. Evaluation criteria and scoring system will be based on categories specific to these projects, as described in the **2018 Premier Livestock Exhibitor syllabus**.
3. **If at the July pre-entry deadline, a minimum of 30 4-H/FFA Exhibitors have not signed up for the Premier Exhibitor Program, the program will be cancelled for the current fair.**
4. No parent of any 4-H/FFA exhibitor, including Delta County Fair Board members, will have any involvement in the selection of a judge in the Premier Exhibitor Program.
5. **Any participant of the Premier Exhibitor Program who does NOT participate in ANY portion of the Premier Exhibitor Program will loose 50% of their total score AND will be INELIGIBLE TO SHOW THAT SPECIES THE FOLLOWING YEAR.**
6. 4-H/FFA Record books will be due at the time of the interview for all participants and must be complete up to that date.
7. An appointed committee of the Fair Board members will determine the Overall Winner for each division by reviewing total points on Saturday prior to the Junior Market Livestock Sale.

1. All goats must be scrapie tagged.
2. Any goat having external parasites will be disqualified and removed from the fairgrounds.
3. There will be a 6:00 am pre-show milk out for dairy goats the morning preceding the show. All does will be inspected by the superintendent and a fair board representative to verify completeness of milk out.
4. ALL goats will be required to have horns tipped blunt, no sharp points will be allowed. Removal of horns is not allowed on the fairgrounds.
5. Bracing will be permitted, however, goats must be held with a collar, chain or show halter only and the front feet must not leave the show ring floor. Judges and superintendents will have discretion to enforce this rule.
6. Classes will be divided into the following types:
 - a. **MEAT TYPE:** Boer, Kiko, Tennessee Fainting Goat, Spanish Goat, or any cross of such breeds.
 - b. **DAIRY TYPE:** Nubian, Lamancha, Nigerian, Alpine, Toggenberg, Oberhausli, Saanen or any cross of such breeds.
7. Any uncertainties as to what type of class does will be left to the discretion of the superintendent.

4-H/FFA JUNIOR DIVISION SPECIFIC RULES:

9. Market classes are open to any meat type breed or cross of breeds.
10. **Market goats must be slick shorn, with no indication of blocking to 3/8" or less above the knees and hock joints to include the head but excluding the tail switch.**
11. Goats must be shown without hairdressing compounds including: oils, paints, powders, artificial coloring or other dressings.
12. **All market goats must be shown with a collar, chain or show halter.**
13. Pair of Market Goats entries are limited to one (1) pair of market goats per exhibitor.
14. Pen of Three Market entries are unlimited to a 4-H club or FFA Chapter, however three exhibitors must be represented in each pen group, unless only two (2) members in the club/chapter show goats.
15. Cheese Yield Dairy Goat Class Rules – A cheese yield auction class will be available for exhibitors showing a producing goat. The yield will be based upon the amount of milk produced by the goat in a 24-hour period. One gallon of milk will equal one pound of cheese. The exhibitor will be responsible for purchasing the cheese from a USDA facility and presenting it during the Junior Market Livestock Sale to be auctioned.

JUNIOR DIVISION MARKET GOAT DELTA COUNTY BRED & FED RULES:

16. Bred & Fed Goat Producers must own doe(s) by September of the previous kidding year.
17. Notification that the producer is interested in being part of the program must be made to the Delta County Goat Bred & Fed Program by **March 31st OF EACH YEAR AND** have a completed **Delta County Goat Bred & Fed Producer Application** on file.

18. A.I. or pasture breeding will be acceptable, however; goats must remain in the county during the breeding process. Goats must be bred, kidded and fed in Delta County.
19. Scrapie tags are mandatory for all animals.
20. The **producer scrapie tag # AND the animal scrapie tag #** will be used for identification purposes.
21. Producers will be required to fill out the "Producer Sale List" which lists goats they sell and the 4-H/FFA Members they sell to as well as tag numbers and descriptions of each animal.
22. Producers will receive and issue "Delta County Goat Bred & Fed Certificate of Purchase." These certificates are given to each member purchasing a goat, one certificate per animal. If two goats are purchased, two certificates will be given.
23. **Producer Sale List forms must be turned into the Delta County Goat Bred & Fed committee one week prior to weigh-in.**
24. **Goats must be designated by members at initial weigh-in and exhibitors MUST come with their Delta County Goat Bred & Fed Certificate of Purchase for each eligible animal to weigh-in as Bred & Fed.**
25. Following selection of the Champion and Reserve Champion Bred & Fed Goat, others will then be brought back and placed from there on down.

HORSE SHOW RULES/REGULATIONS:

- In all cases where speed is the test, no premiums shall be awarded without competition.
- A 4-H/FFA member is responsible for knowing the specific rules of the show in which he/she has entered.
- The latest edition of the Colorado 4-H Horse Show Rule Book will govern the horse show; or the AQHA Rule Book if a rule is not available in the 4-H Rule Book.
- All ages are determined as of DECEMBER 31, 2017.
- The 4-H/FFA member should have complete access to the project horse(s) at any time and must provide care and management a majority of the time since May 1 of the current year, whether the horse is owned or leased. Horse identification certificates and lease agreements for 4-H and FFA members must be on file with the Extension Office by May 1 of the current year and a \$5 ID fee must be paid per horse. Maximum ID fee is \$20 per member.
- Horses entered in any of the classes must be identified by May 1 and complete records must appear in the exhibitor's record book. The horse identification certificates must be the same as the record book. Members must present their record books to the Superintendent for approval prior to receiving exhibitor packet.

7. If professional training is necessary, due to safety issues or a member using a green horse, the member must be involved 50% of the time while the horse is at the trainers. The total time at the trainers shall not exceed 20 days from June 1 until the Delta County Fair Horse show.
8. A horse may only be shared by siblings and only shown by siblings if they show or are entered in different age divisions or classification.
9. This is an all-breeds show and horses will be judged accordingly. Gaited horses will perform a comparable gait to the trot. They will be required to lope/canter with the exception of Novice classes.
10. The Delta County Horse Show, consisting of written test, showmanship, halter, Western and English will be held **Sunday, August 5, 2018**. The working ranch horse and Gymkhana will be held **Monday, August 6, 2018**.
11. All 4-H/FFA horse exhibitors must take the Written Test and compete in the Showmanship class to be eligible to show in the performance classes, including the Gymkhana, Working Ranch, English and Western Divisions.
12. Levels Testing: Written tests must be completed and passed by July 1, 2018. Riding tests must be completed and passed by July 6, 2018. Use of approved Levels Rating Judges for the Riding Tests is required and the Extension Office should be notified of intent to test prior to actual testing.
13. The Novice division is limited to horse project members who have attempted but not passed Level 1 written and riding tests. Yearly attempts must be made to successfully pass the Level 1 test. First year project members are encouraged, but not required to attempt Level 1. All Novice Classes are performed in walk-trot only.
14. You must request permission from show management to approach a judge to ask questions or ask for critique. Under no circumstances may an exhibitor, parent, leader or spectator badger, insult or be argumentative with a judge, show secretary, ring steward or show management. Any flagrant display of poor sportsmanship or affront to the judge or ring steward, by or on behalf of the exhibitor may result in exclusion of the exhibitor from competition and forfeiture of awards or expulsion from the show grounds for the person and/or exhibitor.
15. No horse or pony may be shown in any class at a 4-H/FFA show if any forbidden substance has been administered in any form. A forbidden substance is any stimulant, depressant or local anesthetic which might affect the performance of a horse. Stimulants and depressants are defined as medications which stimulate or depress the circulatory, respiratory, or central nervous systems. Also prohibited are any drugs, regardless of how harmless or innocuous they might be, which by their very nature, might mask or screen the presence of the aforementioned prohibited drugs, or prevent or delay testing procedures. The use of these drugs is considered physical abuse and will be enforced through the general rules and requirements. The full use of modern therapeutic measures including phenylbutazone for the improvement and protection of the health of the horse is permitted, unless the treatment may also stimulate or depress the circulatory, respiratory or central nervous systems. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to declare in written form, any veterinarian's prescribed medication to show management prior to the start of the show.
16. Decision of the judge is final. A judge may, at his/her discretion excuse and/or penalize a horse for unsoundness and/or may excuse a rider whose mount is not under suitable control and/or is using unacceptable tack or equipment. Rules 1, 20 and 21 of the Colorado 4-H Show Rule book will be strictly enforced.
17. A Primary Care Form must be filed with the Extension Office by May 1, 2018 in order to participate in the Delta County Fair 4-H/FFA Horse Show. It is the responsibility of every 4-H/FFA member to ensure that proper care is taken of their horse according to acceptable methods of good equine husbandry, as set forth by Colorado State University Cooperative Extension and the Colorado Department of Agriculture. A healthy horse requires sufficient food, water, shelter and healthcare. Cruel and inhumane training methods are not appropriate in the Colorado 4-H Horse Program. Specific equine husbandry guidelines and humane training methods are provided in the Colorado 4-H Horse Project Manual.
18. Horses must be kept in the trailer, stall or arena area. Vehicles and trailers must be parked in designated areas.
19. No bareback riding, no double riding, no trotting, no loping, no other unsafe gaits are allowed outside the specified arenas.
20. Dress Code – see current 4-H Horse Rule Book.
21. The **Written Test** will be held at 8:00 AM **Sunday, August 5, 2018** in the Event Center grandstands. Horse Show exhibitor packets will be handed out at the completion of the written test. The written test is mandatory for all 4-H/FFA horse project members.
22. **Showmanship Contest:** Required by all 4-H/FFA Horse exhibitors. Showmanship will be divided by age: Junior, Intermediate and Senior. There will not be separate Showmanship classes for English and Western. Horses may be shown either Western or English. The first place winners in the Junior, Intermediate and Senior age divisions will be eligible for the Round Robin. There will be a Novice only Showmanship class that will be open to all ages. This class is not eligible for the Round Robin contest. To be eligible for the Round Robin contest, the exhibitor must enter and win the appropriate showmanship class for their age division. Exhibitors must fit and show the same horse in the Round Robin that they won with in the Showmanship class.
23. At no time is anyone, except the youth or another 4-H/FFA member, allowed to ride or exercise the horse. Family members, leaders, trainers or other Delta County 4-H/FFA members may offer reasonable assistance to an exhibitor as long as the contestant is actively involved.

24. Tail extensions will be permitted.
25. A red ribbon must be tied to the tails of kicking horses.
26. Stallions one year of age and older are prohibited in 4-H.
27. **Protective Headgear Policy** – A certified equestrian helmet with safety harness fastened in place is required for over-the-fence classes, gymkhana events, activities and practice sessions (i.e., timed events not involving livestock). It is the responsibility of the parent or guardian of the 4-H/FFA member to see that the headgear worn complies with such standards and is in good condition. The state 4-H Office encourages the use of ASTM Certified/SEI Approved safety helmets in all equine events. Protective headgear may be used in all classes and shall not be discriminated against.
28. Patterns may not follow 4-H Horse Show Rule book. Superintendent may provide alternate patterns for appropriate skill levels. A properly executed flying lead change will score higher than a properly executed simple lead change. A properly executed simple lead change may score higher than a poorly executed flying lead change.
29. To enter English Hunter Hack, the rider must be jump certified by a State Approved rater, their Horse 4-H Leader or qualified FFA Advisor no later than July 6, 2018 by 4:30 pm. The exhibitor's County Fair entry form must be signed and reflect their jump certification status. If the horse/rider cannot pass the jump certification, they may enter English Training Over Obstacles. Exhibitors may only enter Hunter Hack or Training Over Obstacles but not both classes.
30. Once a show order and the exhibitor number is called, the exhibitor MUST appear in this order in the time specified by show officials. When an exhibitor delays a class, the class will be closed at the order of the judge and/or horse show management. The announcer will make three (3) warning calls. Upon issuance of the third (last) call, the class will be closed.
31. No cross entering is allowed.
 - a. Exhibitors entered in any of the Novice Classes may not enter any of the regular classes.
32. All points will be tabulated per the 4-H Horse Show Organization Guide.
33. If any class has only one (1) entry, it may be combined with same class in higher age division, if all parties are agreeable.
34. **Lead Line Class** - Open to ages 5-7. Entries may be tacked in English or Western attire for a horse show. A helmet is required. A halter should be worn under the bridle. Please note that all leadline participants must be accompanied by an adult who is in control of the animal at all times. This means the adult has a leadline properly attached to the animal but is trying to maintain a passive role by letting the rider maintain control of the animal at the same time. Basically, the adult is there in case of emergency, should the rider need immediate assistance with his/her mount.
 - a. Boots with a heel must be worn. No tennis shoes. Judges may ask riders simple questions on the very basics of riding. Handlers are not required to be in show attire but safe and respectable attire for a horse show. Coaching from handlers while entries are in the ring being judged is discouraged and entries will be marked accordingly.
35. **Purpose** – The exhibitor will display his or her ability to steer and show the mount in a class that is appropriate their skill level. Exhibitors in this class may not show in any class at the same show. Leadline is to be evaluated on the rider's position and active involvement in guiding the animal.
36. **Class Procedure and Guidelines** – The entire class shall be worked at a walk, both ways of the ring. At the judge's discretion, the class may be asked to back or to trot. Show management should communicate their expectations regarding gaits to the judge prior to the class entering the ring. The class is to enter the ring at a walk and proceed at the ringmaster's instruction.
37. **Without Lead Line Class** – The rules for the Lead Line Class will be followed except there will not be a handler with the lead line attached to the halter of the horse.

HIGH POINT AWARDS/DIVISION AWARDS - Buckle, Ribbon & Award

Classes included in points calculation for the High Point Awards include: Written Test, Showmanship, English, Western, Ranch Horse and Gymkhana. To be eligible for high point awards, an exhibitor MUST show in at least TWO divisions. The exhibitor with the highest total points will be determined winner regardless of total number of classes entered. If a tie occurs for the High Point awards in any division, the contestant placing highest in Horsemanship or Equitation is declared the winner. If a tie remains, contestant placing highest in Showmanship is declared the winner. If a tie remains, the contestant placing the highest on the Written Test is declared the winner. **Division awards** will be calculated using the division classes. If a tie occurs, the tiebreaker will be the written test followed by showmanship.

SPORTSMANSHIP AWARD

\$20 awarded to the individual who shows outstanding leadership and best attitude during the two days of the show.

HALTER CHAMPION - Shirts

This award acknowledges the Grand and Reserve Champion Halter Horses for mares and geldings.

1. Overnight accommodations and pen space will be allowed for Open Class poultry exhibitors at a rate of \$10 per exhibitor for the week. Pen fees are due to the Poultry Superintendent upon arrival.
2. **The American Standard of Perfection shall govern.**
3. Old Birds should be the property of exhibitor at least six months.
4. Birds entered as singles will not be allowed to compete in pens and visa versa.
5. A trio consists of one male and two females.

6. Birds hatched prior to January 1 of current year shall be entered as “cock”, “old tom”, or “hen”. Birds hatched during the year shall be entered as “cockerel,” “young tom,” or “pullet.”
7. A turkey pair consists of a hen & old tom or a pullet & young tom.
8. **Turkeys** – Meat class will consist of two birds, this year’s hatch. No weight restrictions.
9. **Broiler/Fryer or Roaster** – A young bird of either sex, up to 8 to 10 weeks of age and weighing 3 to 6 pounds, usually of the meat-type breeds. The term is used interchangeably with the term “fryer.” Weight may not vary more than ½ pound.
10. Classes will be judged by BREED GROUPS ONLY.
11. All poultry/ducks must be shown by exhibitors at the judges’ stand on judging day.

1. ARBA Rules shall govern. Refer to the ARBA (American Rabbit Breeders Association) Standards of Perfection Book.
2. Standard weights will be determined by ARBA guidelines.
3. Market rabbits must have been the property of the exhibitor by July 1st of the current show year.
4. Breeding rabbits must have been the property of an in the possession of the exhibitor since May 1st of the current year.
5. All rabbits must be shown in the class truest to its breed, regardless of color, such as red, white, black New Zealand.
6. Once they enter the fairgrounds, no rabbit may be exchanged for another.

7. No rabbit showing illness will be allowed at the fair.
8. No rabbits are to be placed in cages until checked in by the superintendent.
9. Meat pens shall consist of three (3) rabbits, same breed and variety or of mixed breeding. Meat pen rabbits must be weighted when checked in to be eligible to be shown. **Minimum weight 3.5 pounds, maximum weight 5 pounds each.**
10. Mixed breed rabbits may ONLY show in the meat pen class.
11. Fur classes will be for fur types: Specialty (Rex & Satin), Wool, or Regular Fur (all other breeds). Any rabbit entered in any fur class must be entered in his or her regular class first.
12. Cardboard for under rabbit cages is no longer supplied for exhibitors. Plan on brining plenty of cardboard or newspaper to place under rabbit cages to last through the week of fair.
13. Classes are provided by age as follows:
 - a. Junior – Under 6 months of age
 - b. Intermediate – 6 to 8 months of age
 - c. Senior – Over 6 months of age

SHEEP RULES/REGULATIONS:

1. Age of animals in this department will be reckoned from December 31, 2017.
 2. In an effort to eradicate scrapie in the United States, USDA requires sheep to have flock identification ear tags that list their flock of origin. Animals required to have flock ID tags include: all sheep sexually intact regardless of age and whethers 18 months of age and older or upon change of ownership. All market and breeding sheep for show or exhibition, regardless of age, must have a registration tattoo with registration or tattoo that is legible.
 3. **OPEN CLASS** - Pedigree of sheep in all classes must be awarded in the American and foreign records for the particular breed to which they belong.
 4. **Wool Breeds:** Columbia, Corriedale, Ramboulet, Merino, other
 5. **Meat Breeds:** Suffolk, Hampshire, Southdown, Shropshire, other
- 4-H/FFA DIVISION SPECIFIC RULES:**
6. **All market lambs must be slick shorn at the Fair weigh-in.**
 7. All sheep must have scrapie tags at initial weigh-in.
 8. In all Market Lamb Classes, the Front feet of the sheep must remain on the show ring floor while being shown. Judges and superintendents will have discretion to enforce this rule.
 9. Pair of Market Lambs – entries are limited to one (1) pair of market lambs per exhibitor.

10. Pen of Three Market Lambs – entries are unlimited per club/chapter but three exhibitors must be represented in each pen group, unless only two members in the club exhibit sheep.

DELTA COUNTY BRED & FED SHEEP CLASS RULES:

- 11. Sheep must be bred & fed in Delta County in the year of the current fair.

SWINE RULES/REGULATIONS:

1. All sows 2 years old or over will be excluded from premiums unless they have produced a litter of pigs.
2. A litter is three (3) pigs, either sex. A hog may be shown as an individual and as one of the litter.
3. Age classifications of swine:
 - a. Senior – farrowed between September 1 and March 1
 - b. Junior – farrowed between March 1 and September 1

4-H/FFA DIVISION SPECIFIC RULES:

4. All hogs must be washed and clean prior to fair weigh-in.
5. **All swine must be watered in their pens using a nipple waterer. No water tubs will be allowed.**
6. **On show day, in both showmanship and market classes, hogs can only be shown with water as a dressing. For example, no hairdressing compounds including oils, paints, powders, artificial coloring or other dressings to include hoof ointments or treatment paints. Violation will result in automatic disqualification.**
7. **For show eligibility, hair length on the swine body (hams, top, sides, belly and shoulders) must be at least one half inch. Swine with body hair length less than one half inch are not eligible for the show. This rule is to satisfy hog processing plant requirements.**
8. **Pen of Three Market Swine** – Three exhibitors must be represented in each pen group unless only 2 members are in the 4-H Club/FFA Chapter that exhibit swine.

DELTA COUNTY BRED & FED SWINE RULES:

9. Pigs must be purchased from a registered Delta County Bred & Fed Swine producer. Each 4-H/FFA member purchasing a pig from a Bred & Fed eligible producer **must** receive an official, embossed bill of sale from said producer at time of purchase.
10. **Members must take all bills of sale associated with their pigs to the CSU Extension Office as part of initial swine registration by May 4th at 5:00 pm in order for their pigs to be declared as Bred & Fed eligible.**
11. 4-H/FFA members wishing to enroll in the Delta County Bred & Fed Swine program must designate pigs as such at the initial swine tag and registration via the CSU Extension Office.
12. The Bred & Fed Committee will examine Bill of Sales and other paperwork for each Bred & Fed eligible/registered pig to ensure its breed, coloring and sex corresponds with official producer records. This information, along with litter photos from the producers will be retained by the Bred & Fed Committee for documentation and cross-reference for pig identification purposes and will be used in the event a discrepancy arises prior to or during the County Fair.
13. **Pigs must be properly tagged with a numbered, tamper resistant official Swine Bred & Fed ear tag in the left ear before leaving the producer's property and photos turned into the CSU Extension Office for Initial Registration must clearly show the Bred & Fed tag to be eligible to register as Bred & Fed.**
14. The Bred & Fed Ear tag must be an official tag and if it becomes dislodged, the Bred & Fed Committee must replace it. The new tag will then be recorded in the official registry.

15. Any 4-H/FFA member and/or producer attempting to pre-register or show a pig at the Delta County Fair which has not been properly tagged, photographed and recorded will not be allowed to be entered in the Bred & Fed Program and will be disqualified.
16. If a member attempts to register/show a pig in the Bred & Fed Class which does not correspond with the breed, coloring and/or tag numbered entered in the current year's Bred & Fed Registry, the Bred & Fed Committee shall have the final determination as to whether the pig is eligible for Bred & Fed Status. If a member is found to have switched or modified a Bred & Fed ear tag without the assistance of the Committee, that member and all of his/her pigs for that year will be disqualified for exhibition as Bred & Fed.
17. 4-H/FFA Members must **pre-enter EACH** eligible pig in the Market Swine Bred & Fed class prior to the Delta County Fair utilizing the appropriate pre-entry forms provided at the CSU Extension Office in Delta and return such pre-entry by the pre-entry deadline. **Pre-Entries must include the tag number and producer name for each Bred & Fed eligible pig.** Pigs not properly registered will not be allowed to compete in the Bred & Fed class at the Fair. NO EXCEPTIONS.
18. If the Grand Champion Market Swine is not Delta County Bred & Fed but the Reserve Grand Champion is, then the Reserve Grand Champion Market Swine shall also become the Champion Bred & Fed Swine. To select the Reserve Champion Swine Bred & Fed hog, all Delta County Bred & Fed pigs that received a First Place Premium in their respective Market Swine class OR were the First placing Delta County Bred & Fed pig in their market class (i.e – 1st and 2nd place were not Bred & Fed but 3rd place was, the 3rd place Bred & Fed pig in that class will advance) will be brought back into the show ring and the Reserve Champion will be selected.
19. **The Delta County Swine Bred & Fed Committee, not the Swine Superintendents, shall make all determinations of eligibility to show in the Bred & Fed Class by referencing their official rules, producer sale records and fair pre-entries.**

5. If there is a problem, the superintendent of Heritage Hall or a CSU representative working in the office will be contacted in the office at the front of the building.
6. The Hall superintendent shall have the authority to deal with violations of these rules actually observed or heard first hand by the superintendent.
7. No exhibit shall be removed or moved to a different location without permission of the Heritage Hall superintendent.
8. **Heritage Hall Superintendents are responsible for the cleaning/delegation of cleaning of Heritage Hall exhibit floors and trash during the week of fair.**

5. **Judging of the 4-H Walls will take place on Wednesday of Fair between 8:00 am and 4:00 pm. Awards will be presented prior to the Livestock Sale on Saturday at 1:30 pm.**
6. The Fair Board will take every precaution for the safety of articles exhibited, but does not assume any responsibility in case of loss or damage. Security has been installed at Heritage Hall.
7. **PEOPLE’S CHOICE 4-H CLUB WALL AWARD** - Voting will start Wednesday of Fair and continue until Friday at 7:00 pm. The winner will be announced on Saturday at 1:30 at the Events Center prior to the Livestock Sale.
